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## Rector's Letter

Dear Friends:

I want to thank each and every parishioner for all you do to make St. Paul's this wonderfully inclusive, diverse, and vibrant parish family. Your financial support is deeply appreciated.

This past year has been a remarkable year for St. Paul's as we have been drawn beyond ourselves to the edges of what we find familiar. We have gone to "Galilee," where the disciples were sent after the resurrection.

One example of this is our Refuge for Refugee ministry that has invited us into relationship with folks whose life experience is beyond our imagination. Just have a conversation with the families we've welcomed and supported from Afghanistan and Burma and your life will be changed.

Another example is a family in southeast Raleigh that has a home that we built with them through our work with Habitat for Humanity.

We have built relationships with our Muslim brothers and sisters through both the Islamic Association of Cary as well as the Institute of Islamic and Turkish Studies.

We have seen the wonderful videos produced by the Stewardship Committee that so well show the vastness of ministry here at St. Paul's, videos now available on our church website [www.stpaulscary.org](http://www.stpaulscary.org).

In a parish the size of St. Paul's, while everyone is not able to be a part of every area of our parish life, know that fellow parishioners are, and they appreciate the areas you are involved with that they are not. But one area of parish life in which every one of us needs participate is stewardship. All of us need to pledge our financial support to St. Paul's.

As you make your decision to pledge, I hope you will consider increasing your pledge over last year's pledge. My wife Mary and I intend to increase ours. Among the many ways Mary and I offer our financial support, there is none more significant to us than St. Paul's. If you have never pledged before, I'd like to personally invite you to do so. Whatever you pledge, it will be a good beginning of a life long journey of generosity. The average pledge in the Episcopal Church is about 2.5% of one's annual income.

Many years ago a priest said to me: "We read the gospel as if we have no money, and we spend our money as if we know nothing of the gospel." Let us not live in that convenient dualistic way, but rather may we be formed and continually transformed by the life and movement of Jesus in our lives and in the ways we use the gifts God has given us.

On November 13, we all will be invited to offer our pledge to St. Paul's and surround that day with liturgical celebration, fellowship, and food. Please join the celebration.

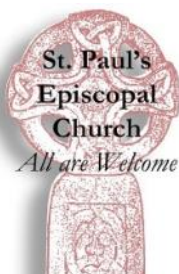

## Lobster Fest 2016

The sun was shining, smiling volunteers were in place, music played inside and out, food was delicious, and St. Paul's put together another memorable Lobster Fest for the community. Cap'n Jeff Kager and his crew launched our new lobster cooker, while First Mate Kevin Swann and his team oversaw supply and distribution.

Inside, the Galley ran like clockwork under the experienced eyes of Chief Cook Rob, while the incredible planning of his better half, Vickie Johnson, was evident in every detail. The Lobsta Roll station, serving line, greeters, set-up, clean-up, and prep teams all worked together "swimmingly," and Tad Richard's planning, along with check-in crew and helpful hosts were our Lifeboat.

From a dollar standpoint, we should net about \$16,000, which the Men's Group will apportion to Outreach, Inreach, and the Men's Group discretionary funds (which end up going towards specific St. Paul's projects). We sold more lobster rolls this year than any other time (about 1,100), but fewer total lobsters (something over 1,300). The weather was beautiful, and we were more ambitious with our ordering (last year's weather was "challenging," yet we ran out of lobster rolls and lobsters), but this year's good weather also offered potential walk-up candidates other options (Blue Grass Festival, football games, Octoberfest, etc.) and our overall attendance was slightly below last year. The congregation has been helpful in assisting our "inventory" over-supply issues by purchasing remaining Lobsta Rolls on Sunday, and frozen lobsters on subsequent dates. (Check with us to see

if any remain should you have an interest in making lobster salad, lobster bisque, or just reheating and dipping in butter!).

If you helped with Lobster Fest (and about 150 of you did), take a look at the [photos on St. Paul's web site](#) to see and be reminded of the fun that went along with Lobster Fest. If you weren't able to be part of the crew, please view the photos to get an idea what is in store for next year.

Lobster Fest takes an effort by a lot of folks at St. Paul's, and the rewards include our guest's smiles, awe, appreciation, and vows to return next year. This is truly a parish-wide event, and the result reflects the incredible job you do, and the efforts of all of us in making St. Paul's an "All Are Welcome" destination.

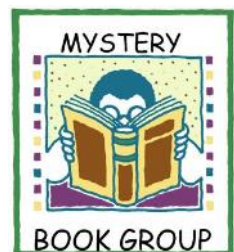

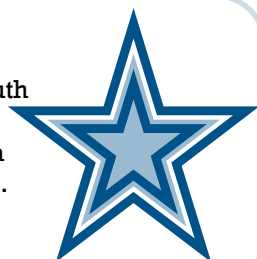

#### Adult Study for Advent: The Coming of God in Christ

Nov. 27, Dec. 4, Dec. 11, Dec. 18: At the heart of Advent is a longing for God to come into our hearts, our minds, and in our time. It can be a personal longing as well as a larger cultural longing. It has also been a historic longing satisfied in the birth of Jesus, the Christ – not just the infant of Bethlehem, but the full person, the Son of God.

Perhaps the greatest expression of this longing is the hymn, *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel*. On Sunday mornings in Advent, we will use this hymn and its roots in the "O antiphons" as a way to study the theology of Jesus – what theologians call Christology. This involves a deeper understanding than the historical Jesus, for what we proclaim in our faith entails not just history, but God's presence breaking through to us now. We will seek ways of understanding the meaning of Jesus through the lens of prophetic hope.

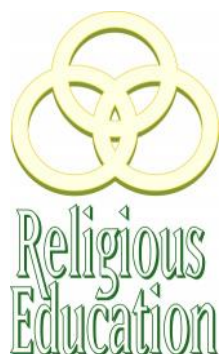

Family Promise of Wake County (formerly Wake Interfaith Hospitality Network, or WIHN) is a coalition of faith communities that helps families without homes achieve independence by providing temporary housing, lodging, meals, case management, and educational services. St. Paul's serves as a support congregation, providing meals, supplies, and volunteer support to families temporarily residing at White Plains United Methodist Church in Cary several times each year.

St. Paul's 4<sup>th</sup> hospitality support week for this year is Nov. 27 thru Dec. 4. This provides a wonderful "hands-on" outreach opportunity, both for adults and for families, including:

- ◆ Room Set Up: Sunday, Nov. 27 at 2:00 p.m.

## St. Nicholas is coming to St. Paul's!

St. Nicholas is coming! Look for the St. Nicholas tree in the narthex, starting Nov. 13<sup>th</sup>. St. Nicholas Sunday is Dec. 4<sup>th</sup>.

We have gotten about 450 names and gift ideas from five agencies that serve children and families in our community: CommWell Health in Newton Grove, West Haven Housing Ministry, Healing Transitions (formerly, The Healing Place), The Caring Place, and Families Together.

■ We began the St. Nicholas ministry in the early 1980s to provide Christmas presents for the children at an Episcopal-sponsored orphanage located in Charlotte, NC. Back then, they gave us the names of the children with a wish list for each child. We published the list, and people brought gifts...lots of gifts. It was clear that St. Paul's could serve another agency.

■ At the time, St. Paul's was actively involved in our Diocese's nascent Episcopal Farmworker Ministry (EFwM), providing clothing and support services weekly to migrant farmworkers in Newton Grove. The EFwM program was located at the TriCounty Health Center, a migrant health program operated by the local county health departments and funded by the federal government to provide health care to migrant farmworkers. Since then, TriCounty has expanded its services and changed its name to CommWell Health, but it is still a community-governed and community-owned organization that provides health care to seasonal farmworkers in Eastern NC. Our diocese has since established a permanent EFwM facility, El Centro Episcopal, next door to the Tri-County health facility to minister to and to serve seasonal farmworkers better. St. Paul's has supported the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry from its inception in the early '80s, and the Advent Tree was created to accommodate the larger number of names that came about by adding the children of seasonal farmworkers to our St. Nicholas list. We still continue to get many children's names from CommWell

Health.

■ In 2001, we added children from the Episcopal Housing Ministry (EHM) (now known as West Haven Housing Ministry) to the St. Nicholas list. EHM was a St. Paul's- and Diocesan-sponsored initiative to provide low-income, safe, housing for the working poor in Wake County. It has now been turned over to a private agent, West Haven, to manage.

■ The next year, we included children identified by Healing Transitions (formerly, The Healing Place) in Raleigh. These gifts go to the children of clients recovering from substance abuse.

■ The Caring Place (added in 2008) and Families Together (added in 2010) provide housing and job-counseling for the homeless in Cary and Wake County.

Healing Transitions asks us not to wrap the presents we provide since they want their recovering clients to wrap the gifts for their children themselves. This way, each client knows what he/she is giving.

We have bundled together some of the tags again this year. Each bundle represents all of the children in a single family. These bundled tags will be held by the St. Nicholas figure that will be standing on the counter by the tree. If you are inclined to make purchases for an entire family, please look for these bundled tags.

December 4<sup>th</sup> is the Sunday this year to bring your gifts and present them to St. Nicholas! If you are unable to attend services on this day, please deliver your gifts to the office BEFORE then so they will reach these wonderful children on time. Presents received after noon on December 4<sup>th</sup> will not get to the child this year (but they will be saved and will be used for a child next year).

Thank you for your generosity and kindness. It is appreciated by people from all across North Carolina. Amazing!

### Episcopal Farmworker Ministry and Hurricane Matthew

Thank you, St. Paul's community! You have once again given testimony to your faith through the generosity you have shown to those in need.

With Hurricane Matthew and the consequent flooding in eastern North Carolina, the Diocese sent out a call for assistance to the Episcopal Farmworker Ministry ([EFwM](#)) in Newton Grove. Several camps were flooded and the workers lost everything. EFwM faced an immediate and urgent need for donations!

We told you, the St. Paul's congregation, about the need and you responded generously. By mid- to late-October (when we wrote this status report), we had taken six vehicle loads of food, clothing, toiletries, and bedding to the Diocesan House for distribution to EFwM. Between the flooding, damage, and displacement of people, the Diocese wanted to coordinate the collection, distribution and delivery of donations.

The need will continue well beyond the immediate effort. We at St. Paul's

have a long history of support for the EFwM, going back to even before its establishment as a joint ministry of our diocese and the Diocese of East North Carolina in 1982. If you have donations to contribute, please put them in the gray bin to the right of the narthex. They will be brought to the Diocesan House and EFwM. And of course, monetary donations would be welcomed at any time.
