What would you most like to see accomplished during your three years of service on the Vestry?

I would like to be a part of the Vestry that leads a capital campaign aimed at retiring our building debt, increasing our budget amount for outreach and providing the staff with well-earned and appropriate salary compensation that match market rates for a parish of our size.

What community groups and events are you involved in?

Does having a club travel-team soccer player count? For those of you in the same boat, you know what I mean.  $\square$  Aside from soccer, a full-time job as the Associate Director of student housing at UNC-Chapel Hill and my church involvement, our family enjoys spending time camping with friends. One of the activities that I am most involved with through my work is as a diversity trainer. I've been actively involved with a number of programs and initiatives in my department and with other campus committees. I'm most proud that in 2014, the North Carolina Housing Officers honored me with the Lexie Kamerman Dedication to Social Justice and Peace Award. I was the first recipient in our state association to receive this award, named in honor of an Elon College student who was tragically killed in a bombing in Kabul, Afghanistan. I find this work to be very fulfilling to me personally.

In my work life, I oversee the operations side of a 10,000 bed college housing department with 3.3 million square feet of facility space and \$54 million in annual revenue. Even though that sounds like a lot of money, our resources are often tight and we frequently have to make difficult budget decisions. I think this skill and experience will help me serve on the St. Paul's vestry if elected.
