Easter and Eastertide with celebrations of renewal and resurrection *St. Paul's focus upon children and youth along with their leaders*

TEXT: Luke 24:32-36


They said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?" That same hour they got up and returned to Jerusalem; and they found the eleven and their companions gathered together. They were saying, "The Lord has risen indeed, and he has appeared to Simon!" Then they told what had happened on the road, and how he had been made known to them in the breaking of the bread. While they were talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

REFLECTIONS:

The resurrection of Christ is God's surprise. Life overcomes death. The risen Christ is not expected, not recognized. Grief sees a gardener, sadness meets an uninformed stranger on the road to Emmaus. But there is joyful recognition upon hearing one's name, in the blessing of the meal. Eucharist. The astounding news requires excited gathering and sharing stories. And abruptly into their midst comes Jesus blessing them with peace. The former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams, observed, "The resurrection is God's unequivocal 'Yes' to all the diverse bits of humanity - it is God's commitment to a reconciled world. . . It brings forth new social patterns: forgiveness, peacemaking, patience, and truth-telling."

PRAYERS:

In this season of resurrection joy, we accept God's invitation to be ever-mindful of the needs of others, offering our prayers on behalf of God's community in the church and the world. We give thanks for the Good News. We celebrate the children and youth of St. Paul's who surround us with wonder and laughter, excitement and potential. We thank you for their families and for church friends who teach and guide them as they grow in grace and understanding. O God, in the evening hour, the risen Christ revealed himself to his disciples in the breaking of bread. Feed us with the bread of life and break open our hearts, that we may know him not only in the good news of the scriptures, but risen in the midst of your pilgrim people. Amen.

ART:
